We utilized those meetings to hear from the membership, ways we could improve on the delivery of programming, and enhance our ability to serve our members now and moving forward. I want to thank all areas of British Columbia and the Yukon for the warm welcome extended to us during the engagement tour. An additional goal was to provide updates and communicate trends both provincially and nationally, that directly impact what we are trying to accomplish. This year, we will introduce the Indigenous Impact and Legacy Award to be given out at the Annual Congress in recognition of significant contributions made by Indigenous people and organizations in the game. Our priority is to ensure that every hockey program in the Branch, is inclusive of the Indigenous members from our communities while respecting their unique history and rich culture.

I would be in remiss if I did not take a moment to acknowledge the incredible individuals' I have had the pleasure of serving with as your Board of Directors. We spend a considerable amount of time on the



review and development of policy to keep our game moving forward. Together we have committed to making tougher decisions that recognize changes or policy development that better optimize opportunities for growth and retention. I would like to extend a sincere thank you to a member of our board who will not be returning next year. Brian Harrison has been a dedicated, tireless member of our board, never missing an opportunity to ensure that Minor Hockey Associations were always included in conversations around developing or reviewing policy. Brian is an incredible statesman who I have relied on to provide a view based on his extensive experience as a teacher, administrator, and advocate for doing what is right regardless of how difficult it may seem. Brian, the game is better simply by your involvement and dedication.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone for their support this past season. It has been an honor, and the highlight of my life, to serve as Chair of this great organization. I look forward to next year and hope that we can continue to do what we must, to provide opportunities for the youth throughout our great branch. Keep doing the many things you all do so well, and remember that there is nothing we can't accomplish together.



Operational Report

Hockey continues to motivate us by providing an outlet to work hard, to have fun and to do our best to be better every day. We don't always achieve our goals, but the pursuit is definitely worth every effort we make. BC Hockey is a strong organization with an incredible number of moving parts, and this past season provided us with ample opportunity to showcase all that we do to further our sport.

Our Member Engagement process continues to be a valuable method of providing our organization with input and feedback in our quest to provide programming support to our local associations and teams. These meetings take place annually in each of our Districts, and if you have not attended one please find a way to do so – it is the best way for you to contribute to the process of guiding the game here and across the country.

Consultation and dialogue with our members has led to the establishment of three (3) core priorities by the BC Hockey Board of Directors, and these have served as our focus operationally over the past year: *growth of the game, safety of participants, and standardization of programming.*

Growth of the Game

Our commitment to “**Lead, Develop and Promote Lifelong Positive Hockey Experiences**” creates the need to develop an inclusive environment across lines of race, gender, age, religion, identity, and experience. Our work with leaders from Indigenous communities, the BC Government and Hockey Canada continues to be an important factor in our attempts to share our game with an extended group of people, and it is exciting to be a part of welcoming new participants into the hockey family.

The past year was key in our process of restructuring the operational model for female hockey in British Columbia and the Yukon. The release of the BC Hockey Female Hockey Report this winter represents the commitment within our membership to promote the female game and we are very encouraged at the prospects for what we can achieve in the coming years. Aligning with the strategic growth plans of BC Hockey and Hockey Canada, and the Government of Canada's 2017 “Women and Girls in Sport” report, the Female Hockey Report focuses us on two (2) key items: to implement an organizational structure for female hockey programming and to work toward the creation of female hockey associations. The model was created based on interviews with 27 MHAs throughout BC and the Yukon, as well as discussions with Hockey Canada and other provincial members and work continues on the action items generated by this review.

Safety of Participants

The well being of our players, officials, coaches and volunteers is at the forefront of all our efforts. In October 2018 BC Hockey partnered with Buddy Check for Jesse, a program which calls upon our coaches to deliver messages to their teams offering support with any mental health struggles that they may encounter. As part of the pilot project BC Hockey worked with all the Minor Hockey Associations in Greater Victoria as well as all BC Hockey Zone Leagues in October 2018 to participate in an awareness weekend for Mental Health. For the 2019 season we are looking to expand the program to the entire province.

In partnership with viaSport, we have been working together with other PSOs to educate and participate in Safe Sport Training to enhance and review current policies and codes of conducts to ensure they are in line to provide children with the best care possible. This review and action will proceed into the 2019-2020 season.



Our policy requiring Junior and Intercollegiate players to wear full facemasks was implemented this season and resulted in positive outcomes, reducing facial injuries and causing a substantial reduction in incidents of fighting at the Junior B level.

Several alliances have proven to benefit our players in the past year. We partnered with HeadCheck Health in July 2018 to establish standardization and improve concussion care for all players across BC Hockey. This software was implemented at the Zone Program and Junior levels this season and work continues toward rollout at the MHA level. A partnership with ePACT network was announced in April 2019 to ensure participant medical information is readily available through a highly secure online emergency network, which allows for reduced costs and volunteer requirements for our members who set up an account with ePACT. A Diversity and Inclusion presentation was delivered to all Zone Program team staff at the start of the 2018-2019 season and will continue as a standard aspect of our operations.

Standardization of Programming

BC Hockey continues our efforts to be at the forefront of fundamental developments in the emerging player pathway and Long-Term Athlete Development (LTAD) model for the sport of hockey in Canada. Initiation/Novice Programming has been successful under a focused approach to young players learning to play hockey in an environment that fosters the overall goal to teach the foundational skills of hockey while having fun.

BC Hockey has also developed the Atom Transitional Plan (ATP) to assist with continued development as participants prepare for further development by way of the implementation of the Atom Pathway at the start of the 2020-2021 season. We can all be proud of the role our associations have played in improving the game for our incoming group of participants. With the adjustments being made to the upper end of programming under the zone pilot project, the development of our participants is on track for continued refinement.

Our commitment to supporting the local level has developed into a vision to work towards a streamlined regionalized delivery system that eliminates operational redundancies. This strategy has been developed to enhance services and increase support for MHAs, team and leagues. While the groundwork is still being developed, we believe that through partnership with District Associations we can deliver quality member services and support for coaching and officiating while enhancing the Minor Hockey administration of communications, registration and discipline.

Our Minor Hockey Observation Program continued to support member MHAs by reviewing an organization's operation to identify strengths and weaknesses, report to the organization's executive recommending possible actions and assisting the organization with implementing any resulting adjustments. This process involves BC Hockey observer(s) visiting the organization in order to discover how we can help each Association achieve more and has proven time and again to be a valuable process to all involved.

It is impossible to reflect upon hockey within the last year without referencing that Vancouver and Victoria hosted a very successful 2019 World Junior Championship. The hosting of the event was the culmination of three (3) years of planning and preparation and highlighted the support and passion for hockey within our part of the country. The fans in both cities were outstanding, proving that we love our hockey and inspiring us that we can achieve great things within our game.



In the lead up to this great event, BC Hockey partnered with the government of BC and Hockey Canada in hosting the Road to the World Juniors Tour, an interactive school visit in 36 communities across British Columbia. At each stop, students received a floorball demonstration and an introduction of how to play hockey, with each school receiving their own set of Floorball equipment and a copy of the BC Hockey school curriculum.

Our event hosting legacies will continue, with the City of Dawson Creek being once again called upon to host a Hockey Canada event as the 2020 World Junior A Challenge heads to Peace Country. Dawson Creek has served as an event host for several Hockey Canada events over the last five (5) years and will no doubt continue to show that people and top events love to visit British Columbia and the Yukon.

Finally, our players and teams continued to inspire us simply by playing the game, and through their efforts we can boast more than a few outstanding accomplishments. The Female U18 Team BC won a bronze medal at the Canada Winter Games in Red Deer, Alberta after dropping a heart-breaking game in overtime of the semi-final. The BC Hockey League's (BCHL) Prince George Spruce Kings had an incredible post-season run on their way to BCHL and Doyle Cup titles en-route to a birth in the National Junior A Championship. The Revelstoke Grizzlies from the Kootenay International Junior Hockey League (KIJHL) took home the 2019 Cyclone Taylor Cup, earning the title of BC Hockey Junior B champions.

It is exciting to reflect on all that we have accomplished and we look forward to continuing to strive for improvement to our planning, administration and systems that will keep hockey at the forefront of our society.



STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Conduct Committee

The Conduct Committee has continued to work diligently to fulfill its mandate as prescribed by BC Hockey Policy.

The Committee continued to review all aspects of the Conduct Policy and monitor sections of the policy as required.

Specific areas reviewed centered on the minimum suspension guidelines as they relate to unsportsmanlike conduct directed at officials. It was agreed that the present guidelines correctly differentiate between general incidents of unsportsmanlike conduct and harassment of officials.

The investigative process for indefinite suspensions was also reviewed.

Social policy continued to be an area that required further attention. It was felt that Associations, Leagues and teams should have a process in place to regularly monitor their social media platforms.

The Committee has also been developing a Whistle-Blowing Policy which, it is hoped, will be completed in time for review by the Governance Committee and the Board of Directors by the annual BC Hockey Congress. The purpose of this WB policy is to provide guidelines for all those involved with BC Hockey to make complaints related to perceived inappropriate, unethical, illegal or fraudulent conduct associated with our organization.

Thank you to Committee Members David Patterson, Joe O'Shea, Joe Barry, Bonnie Cameron, Neil McNabb, and Trudy Alexander for once again doing an outstanding job on behalf of the organization. Thank you also to staff Sean Raphael and Barry Petrachenko for making our task easier.

As I will be retiring as a Board Director, I would like to conclude by stating that serving as Chair of the Conduct Committee has been a rewarding and satisfying experience. I wish the organization and its members well.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee held three (3) meetings since the 2018 BC Hockey AGM, on November 6, January 25 and February 27. During this time the committee reviewed quarterly financial statements and Terms of Reference for the Finance Committee and recommended the approval of the 2019-2020 BC Hockey budget to the Board. Additionally, the group considered and brought forward recommendations to the Board of Directors on the proposed membership fee three (3) year increase. Another item addressed by the committee was the process used for budgeting employee retirement allowances, further work is being done with the BC Hockey appointed accountant to review this procedure.

A fourth meeting will be held in mid-May to review the draft financial statements as at March 31, 2019, and the committee will also do a review of BC Hockey's internal controls with respect to financial matters.

The Governance Committee completed the following tasks during the 2018–2019 season:

- Our first task was to review what happened at the 2018 AGM and the disposition of the 2018 resolutions by the Members. There were a couple of resolutions that required review by the Governance Committee to bring them back to the Members at the 2019 AGM. There were also some resolutions that were not supported by the Members. From the discussion at the 2018 AGM it seemed that the Members were not properly engaged with some resolutions. It was felt that unless there is some urgency, resolutions should be delayed to provide an opportunity for full engagement with and input from the Members regarding the resolutions before they reach the resolution process.
- The Governance Committee reviewed its terms of reference with regard to its role in the resolution process. The Governance Committee is a recommending body responsible to provide support and guidance and make recommendations to the Directors. The Directors are responsible to approve each and every resolution that forms the Resolution Package.
- The Governance Committee recommended to the Board and the Directors adopted:
 - an award naming procedure.
 - a policy on Annual and Special General Meeting procedures.
- Commenced reviews of the Appeal Process and current Member obligations.
- Conducted a review of BC Hockey Bylaws and Regulations. We have started a full and thorough review and identified a number of potential issues to be addressed. They can be sorted in three (3)

Nominating Committee

Bill Harper, Committee Chair

The Nominating Committee is responsible for ensuring that the Board of Directors is composed of qualified and skilled persons capable of, and committed to, providing effective governance leadership.

The Nominating Committee was established by the Board for the current year at the end of December 2018. This timing limited the productivity of the Committee. Also, unsuccessful efforts were made by the Chair of the Board to connect the Committee chair, Bill Harper, with the former chair of the Committee to transfer knowledge and past experiences.

The Nominating Committee chair met with the current Board of Directors on February 26, 2019, seeking input on desired skill sets and competencies required on the BC Hockey Board for the coming year. The Board reported back to the Nominating Committee following their March 30, 2019, meeting noting that backgrounds in finance, legal and governance are important and that a competency matrix illustrating current Board Member skill sets was being prepared to assist.

At the time of the first nominations deadline, 90 days prior to the AGM, there were no eligible candidates for the first slate of Board candidates. A bulletin was issued to the Membership on March 26, 2019, seeking nominations from the members by the next nomination deadline of April 9, 2019, and the slate of candidates was circulated on April 24, 2019.

The slate of candidates circulated consists of three (3) candidates to fill the four (4) Director positions, and it was noted that a fourth candidate was being vetted for eligibility. The number of candidates identified is less than the number of Board positions available, therefore there will be no election held at the 2019 AGM.

The Nominating Committee received an application from an individual who posed a conflicting loyalty as per BC Hockey Policy 1.05.02. The clause states clearly employees of BCAHA cannot be members of the Board. The Nominating Committee made a request of the Board to wave the policy in this instance. The matter was addressed with the Board of Directors who deemed the individual to be ineligible.

Given this decision, there will be a Board vacancy following the 2019 BC Hockey AGM. As per Bylaw 542, the Board of Directors notified the Nominating Committee chair on May 3, 2019, to solicit nominations for candidates to fill the vacancy on an interim basis and minimize the disruption resulting from the vacancy. The Committee will spend the month of May collecting applications for the Board to make an interim appointment following the AGM for a one (1) year term.

The Nominating Committee will review the Bylaws, Regulations and Policies and make any necessary recommendations to the Association for possible changes to the nomination and election process.

BC Hockey has created an Indigenous Participation Work Group that focuses on a two main themes. First supporting the Truth and Reconciliation items 87 to 91 from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada’s Report. And focusing on a goal to ensure that every hockey program in our Branch is inclusive of Indigenous People at all levels while respecting their unique history and culture.

The work group focused this year on a few key areas that included:

- The development of an Indigenous Participation award that will be awarded at our Annual Congress for the first time this year.
- Research opportunities that provide introduction to hockey programs that encourage participation, assist with equipment challenges, provide a curriculum and equipment to the community as a legacy.
- Work with the Canadian government to amend the Physical Activity and Sport Act to support reconciliation by ensuring that policies to promote physical activity as a fundamental element of health and well-being, reduce barriers to sports participation, increase the pursuit of excellence in sport, and build capacity in the Canadian sport system, that are inclusive of Indigenous peoples.
- Work with the host officials of sanctioned BC Hockey events to promote inclusion and respect to Indigenous Homelands and Territories.
- To ensure that Indigenous peoples’ Homelands and Territorial protocols are respected, and local Indigenous communities are engaged in all aspects of planning and participating in such events.



DIVISIONAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

Adult Male

BCIHL

The BCIHL started the season back down to five (5) teams with the withdrawal of Eastern Washington University. During the off season there was a discussion around the use of full facial protection.

The season went off without incident. Trinity Western University defended their title by defeating Vancouver Island University 2-0 on the championship best of three.

The structure of the league seems strong and expansion is a priority moving forward.

Senior Male AAA / AA

For the 2018-2019 season Senior Male AA had a difficult year. The Kelowna Sparta began the year declaring AAA in order to participate in Alan Cup in Alberta. As the year went on, they became overwhelmed eventually pulling out and which resulted in discipline from Hockey Canada.

The season started with North and South Island Male AA teams both disbanding due to overwhelming workloads to the sole organizers of the teams and lack of player commitment. Powell River attempted to field a team but eventually ran out of time to play their six (6) games thereby becoming ineligible for Coy Cup.

Terrace and Quesnel undeclared for Coy Cup by the Dec 31 deadline. They eventually became the finalists for the CIHL with Quesnel winning. As they had undeclared, Williams Lake and Prince Rupert joined defending champ Dawson Creek and host Fort St. John in the Coy Cup. It was a successful tournament with Dawson Creek defending its title with a victory over the host team.

We are looking at making several changes to the Senior Suspension guidelines, bringing it more in line with the minor hockey supplement. It is important to put the emphasis onto the players and coaches for their actions on the ice, versus continually having to field complaints about the quality of officiating.

Also there has been some interest in determining the CIHL representative to the Coy Cup well before the league champion is determined. It's becoming increasingly difficult to ask for player commitments with so little notice. Finding a way to determine who goes before the January 10 carding deadline will be discussed. Smithers is planning to submit a request for approval to participate in the CIHL. Lastly there was inquiries at the Coy Cup to expand the number of cards available to Senior teams.

Junior Committee

This past season, Junior hockey in BC consisted of 41 Junior B teams made up from three (3) leagues, the Kootenay International Junior Hockey League (KIJHL), the Pacific Junior Hockey League (PJHL) and the Vancouver Island Junior Hockey League (VIJHL), and 17 Junior A teams in the BC Hockey League (BCHL). In addition, there were two (2) BC-based Junior B teams, Dawson Creek Junior Canucks and the Fort St. John Huskies, that played in the North West Junior Hockey League (NWJHL) based out of Alberta.



Junior B

Teams in the Junior B leagues enjoyed another successful season. From prospects tournaments and showcase weekends to the 2019 Cyclone Taylor Cup in April in Campbell River, hosted by the Campbell River Storm. The KIJHL’s Revelstoke Grizzlies came away victorious at the Cyclone Taylor Cup.

BC continues to operate the premier Junior B leagues in Western Canada.

The 2019-2020 season marked the first season in which full face protection was mandated by for all junior B teams in BC Hockey. This is a comparison of head/face injuries from 2017-2018 to 2018-2019:

A new standard player agreement was created to ensure consistency and clear guidelines for teams and participants to adhere to. It has established a strong base for player and team expectations.

The Cyclone Taylor Cup grant was created to allow the pool of applicants to host the championship to grow to potentially each market in Junior B should they choose to apply. For many years, it was too cost-prohibitive to apply to be the host.

Junior A

The BCHL crowned the Prince George Spruce Kings Fred Page Cup champions.

Over the past 13 years, the BCHL has averaged 103 players with scholarships in the league each season. That translates into more than two (2) million dollars annually for players going to college hockey programs. The Bauer BCHL Showcase continues to drive the number of opportunities available to our players.

This past season has been a great year for Junior hockey in BC. With dedicated individuals to each of the teams and leagues, Junior hockey continues to shine in Western Canada. Thank you to all the people who work hard and are dedicated to our game.

A special thank you to the Junior Committee; Chris Hebb (BCHL), Larry Martel (KIJHL), Ray Stonehouse (PJHL), Barb Byrne (VIJHL) and BC Hockey representatives Barry Petrachenko, BC Hockey Chief Executive Officer, Andrew Jakubeit, BC Hockey Board member and Keegan Goodrich, BC Hockey staff resource, for their assistance in making 2018-2019 a great year for Junior hockey.

Minor Committee

The BC Hockey Discipline Task Group's responsibility was to administrate the documentation of suspensions within the Hockey Canada Registry for participants that were penalized with match, gross or refusing to start play infractions at the minor hockey level. They were to complete any applicable investigations and notify the participant of their corresponding suspension. This was the second season for Byron Rice a Coordinator and third season operating with this task group.

The online game incident reporting system saw minor updates this season that improved administration. This was the first season that saw BC Hockey staff administrate discipline. The BC Hockey Regional Centre staff operated as task group members for the Okanagan, North Central and North West Districts.

The task group members have completed their suspensions in a timely manner and we have had very few appeals. Four (4) discipline interviews were conducted surrounding the refusing to start play incidents. Overall, the BC Hockey Discipline Coordinator noted that the task group was very conscientious and worked hard to keep up with the necessary investigations. Positive feedback was received from the district and minor hockey associations. The summary below outlines the incidents processed by the group members.

Operations

June McKenzie, Minor Operations Coordinator

Once more we had a mix of returning and new group members in this Task Group which consists of 11 members and a staff resource person. It includes the Branch Co-ordinator and one (1) representative from each district except the Lower Mainland. The Lower Mainland has three (3) members with duties divided by division – one (1) deals with Novice and Atom Divisions, one (1) with Pee Wee and Bantam



Divisions and one (1) with Midget, Juvenile and Female Divisions. This division has worked well for the last few years.

As a group, we routinely deal with requests for residential waivers, goaltender transfer and relief, tournament teams, recreational player relief, out of province travel requests and movement of Novice players to Atom divisions. We get input from the District Presidents on these requests. This year we started uploading approval letters to Novice age players approved to participate with Atom teams to the players' HCR profile. Hopefully this will make the approvals easier to track.

Tournament Team and Recreational Player Relief requests were up this year. Just over 100 Tournament Team requests were approved. Recreational Player Relief requests doubled to 75.

Requests to move Novice age players to Atom also increased this season. As previously, these were split between player movement and affiliation, with the majority of requests for affiliation. Most of the affiliation requests were for specific dates. Several requests were to dual roster Novice players to female Atom teams.

Overall, goaltender relief requests were fairly consistent with last season. We encourage all teams to affiliate goaltenders as this can greatly relieve stress if a rostered goaltender is unavailable. A few districts had more goaltender relief requests, due to a shortage of goaltenders in the district.

Out of province travel requests were down this season. This was mainly due to Sports Schools or teams consolidating requests.

20 exhibition teams were approved under the new exhibition team policy. All but one (1) of these teams were from the northern districts.

We continued with our monthly video conferences and added a recurring agenda item to review BC Hockey policies. Over the year, we've reviewed the majority of policies dealing with Minor Hockey. This has resulted in proposed amendments to several policies and a new policy to deal with affiliation for minor teams. We'll complete the review next season. I find these monthly meetings invaluable, as besides discussing any issues that a district has, they make people in other areas of the province more aware of challenges that some districts face.

I attend and submit reports to the Operations Video conferences which happen every three (3) weeks. I encourage all associations to attend these videos as there is a lot of information available.

Finally, I'd like to thank the task group members and Bonnie Unwin at the BC Hockey Office for their input and suggestions over the past year.

Minor Relations/Communications

It has been my pleasure to serve as your Minor Relations & Communications Coordinator this past year. As in previous years, I have been tasked with many interesting topics and problems to help provide direction to and or provide mediation. These have included answering members questions on where to find resources to spending numerous days and weeks, even months, assisting members to work through more serious and deeply engrained issues.



We have received complaints of racial, bullying and harassment accusations; unfair evaluation and placement of players on teams at the start of the season; potential coaches feeling they have not been properly evaluated or given detailed reasons as to why they were not selected to coach a team; problems amongst Association executives; so called lack of response from Association appeal or complaints committees when members claim to have submitted appeals to decisions made against them; Members not being given due process to defend themselves against complaints; members threatening to “go to the media or through social media” when there is a problem that seemingly cannot be resolved at the local level. Some of the complaints have come with serious allegations.

I would like to thank all of our office staff for their support and guidance, and in particular Keegan Goodrich, Carla Soares and Barry Petrachenko.

I look forward to serving the membership in 2019–2020.



PROGRAM COORDINATOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Coaching

David Marshall, Branch Coach Coordinator

In the early fall we lost Michael Butler as he moved on to new career. Needless to say, his knowledge of the coaching program was missed. Having said this, the rest of the staff and some volunteers stepped up and together filled the void left by Michael's departure. Not only did they pick up Michael's work, but they continued with all of their other duties as well. They should be commended for the extra time and effort they committed to making everything work.

This season we continued with our goal of finding ways to better serve our coaches, by making the education as relative and meaningful as possible. At the same time, we are looking to increase the quality of education and raise the expectations of those coaches that are leading our player's development. The Coaching Advisory Group made several recommendations on how to improve our delivery, some which will simply be implemented, others that will need to go to the membership for approval. We also continued with our past recommendations and saw a large increase in the successful completion of the coaching modules by our coaches.

Last season we ran a pilot project whereby we implemented "Clinic Seasons". What this showed us is that we were able to provide clinics to coaches in closer proximity to the time that they need it. This season, we implemented this throughout the entire Province. Although there were a couple of exceptions, the majority of the clinics, approximately 98% occurred with these clinic seasons.

With regards to our Development 1 Certification process, we have attempted to ensure that all coaches complete this process within the season that they took the course. To accomplish this, we began the process of scheduling Practice Evaluations immediately following the taking of the clinic. Basically, on Monday morning, Evaluation Leads were provided a list of the coaches within their areas that took the Development 1 clinic over the weekend. The Evaluation Leads in turn started to contact the coaches and Evaluators to schedule their Evaluation. We also reduced the time that coaches had to complete the Post Task. On the surface this sounds like it would be more difficult for the coaches; however, we found the opposite was true. Coaches were able to work with the information they just received in the clinic while it was still fresh in their minds. Additionally, for the coaches that were able to schedule their Practice Evaluation immediately, an opportunity to discuss their progress on the Post Task was created (a Mentorship opportunity) which in turn helped us reinforce the information from the clinic.

Coaching Advisory Group Recommendations

Coach 1: This program is only 2 seasons old and it has been very successful in helping our players learn the game of hockey by developing the skills they need to play. The classroom presentation for the Coaching Clinic has been reviewed and being amended slightly to focus on the importance of skill development.

Coach 2: Amendments to the classroom presentation for the Coach Clinics have been made. The changes will help coaches to navigate the Hockey Canada AP in order to develop their practice plans. There are numerous features to the AP that coaches can utilize to make their planning easier and more efficient.

The Post Task for the Coach 2 delegates was revised and it has been reduced in size. Although it has been reduced, it is more applicable and designed to help coaches evaluate their team's progress and address the needs of the team and individual players. Overall, we believe that this will be a much more beneficial to the coaches.

Development 1: Several changes to the certification process have been recommend. Specifically with regards to the Assistant Coaches. If passed, this will mean that Assistant Coaches will no longer be required to attain full certification, only Head Coaches. However, Assistant Coaches will have an option to complete the certification. We have amended the timelines to complete the Practice Evaluations. Head Coaches will need to complete the Practice Evaluation earlier in the season, in closer proximity to the time that they took the clinic. This will provide coaches with a mentorship opportunity to better reinforce the training received in the clinic. This will also help coaches avoid trying to schedule their Evaluation close to playoffs.

The Practice Evaluation has been changed to match. We have also increased the expectations for the coaches that are being evaluated with emphasis on; skill analysis, error detection and correction, small area games and player / coach communication. The intent is to have coaches more closely engaged with their players in more 1 on 1 situations rather than simply having players go through large drills where coaches have little opportunity to work with individual players.

Facilitator and Evaluator Training: Facilitators and Evaluators will attend training annually, late summer or early fall. In some cases during face to face training, other times via video conferencing. This will allow us to improve our standardization throughout the Province.

Coaching Day in BC

In partnership with the Vancouver Canucks, BC Hockey hosted the 15th annual Coaching Experience in partnership with Tim Hortons. This was a free event and offered coaches from minor hockey associations across BC the opportunity to participate. It occurred on October 20, 2019 and close 90 participants representing a wide variety of age categories and associations attended the one-day seminar at Rogers arena. Craig Sherbaty led a team from the Vancouver Angels Minor Hockey association and their coaches through a live demonstration for those in attendance.

Following the live presentation, participants were afforded the chance to witness one on one training of Vancouver Canuck player Elias Petterson and Vancouver Canucks skills coach Glenn Carnegie and the on-ice aspects concluded with access to both the Vancouver Canucks and visiting Boston Bruins (re-match of the 2011 Stanley Cup Final) full practices.



Off-ice sessions continued with presentations from Craig Sherbaty and Vancouver Canucks' Goaltending coach Ian Clark as part of a lunch hosted in Rogers arena. Long Term Player Development (LTPD) and goaltender specific training were the primary discussion topics.

Website Update

The Coaching Webpage has seen some updates to streamline training and certification qualifications in a more direct and accessible layout. Direct links to Respect in sport and additional coaching information is displayed on the home page in addition to a featured section that directs coaches of at all levels to the Hockey Canada network app.

Female Hockey Development

The 2018-2019 season saw BC Hockey take a deeper look into female hockey, resulting in the creation of the Female Hockey Model.

In undertaking this task, we spoke to minor hockey volunteers from 23 different Minor Hockey and District Associations throughout BC and the Yukon, as well as representatives from Hockey Alberta, Hockey Nova Scotia, and Hockey Canada.

Through these conversations, the following common themes were identified as challenges:

- Lack of Local Teams to Play
- Drop off at Pee Wee/Bantam
- Stigmas Against Female Hockey
- Lack of Female-Specific Skill Development Opportunities
- Losing Players to Academies
- Lack of Ice Time Compared to Male Teams
- Lack of Information for Female Directors
- Skill Gap Between Players
- Lack of Competitive Playing Options Locally
- Lack of Senior Women's Hockey
- Issues with Co-Ed/Female Dressing Rooms

Based on our research and analysis, the following recommendations were developed:

1. Implement an Organizational Structure for Female Hockey Programming
By creating new positions responsible for the oversight of female hockey programming across BC and the Yukon, individuals assigned to these duties will create and ensure that all programming guidelines are clearly communicated to, and delivered at, the local level.
2. Creation of Female Hockey Associations
Female-focused Associations have been identified as being necessary to ensure the growth of female hockey programming. Experience over the past 15 years has shown that FHAs facilitate stronger recruitment initiatives, coaching education and playing opportunities for female players. The formation of FHAs also facilitates increased options for females (especially those in rural areas) to play with other females.



- 3. **Execute Female First Shift Programs**
Utilizing Hockey Canada's existing First Shift programming and framework, we plan to address two (2) of the most prominent problems with female hockey in BC - the lack of recruitment events and shortage of goaltenders.
- 4. **Create Female Multisport Camp Pilot**
BC Hockey will take the lead with other provincial sport organizations to create a one (1) day "Try It Camp" to introduce hockey along with three (3) to four (4) other sports. Communication and recruitment materials would be offered from other participating sports to expose the benefits of sport to as many young females as possible. This will continue to build the interest in female hockey as well as educating athletes on the importance of multi-sport opportunities.
- 5. **Pursue Female Event Hosting**
Events such as the Esso Cup and National U18 Women's Championship allow female players in the host communities to observe exceptional female hockey, and also allows for the creation of recruitment and skill development events around the tournament. The competitors at these events are excellent ambassadors of our sport, and we will work to maximize the benefits of programming in the host community and surrounding area.

Implementing a new organizational structure for female hockey, creating Female Hockey Associations, pursuing the hosting of female events, and updating the Female Player Pathway will serve existing players, allowing more females to play together and empowering our current player and volunteer base.

Through the above measures, we are confident that we will be able to utilize our resources to not only deliver but grow female hockey in our communities.

Female Midget AAA

The Female Midget AAA League completed its ninth season in 2018-2019 season. The Greater Vancouver Comets captured their third consecutive League Championship defeating the Fraser Valley Rush in a thrilling Championship series.

Female Program of Excellence

Female Team BC

The top 140 U16 and U18 Athletes were invited to the Identification Camp in April 2018, from that camp the Top 40 athletes came together at Provincial Camp in Shawnigan Lake. In November 2018, the top 26 players were announced and invited to camp for final selections at Preparation Camp December 20-23, 2018 in Penticton. Coaches ran an effective and strong camp for the evaluation staff to get a thorough view of the players. The best players were selected to represent Team BC at the Canada Winter Games in Red Deer in February 2019.

A focus on the Female Team BC game plan for Canada Winter Games was mental preparation and support along with their physical support in the game. The team showed very strong at Canada Winter Games, undefeated in round robin, with our only loss to Team Alberta in the semi final. Team BC faced Ontario in the bronze medal and came out with our third bronze in four (4) years. Our head coach, Delaney Collins was one (1) of the three (3) female head coaches who finished on the podium. This was the first time in the Canada Winter Games that there was three (3) female head coaches on the podium.



U12/U14 Development Camps

On January 5 and 6, 2019 we hosted U12/U14 Development camp in Langley, BC. We had five (5) teams of athletes attend the camp. Delaney Collins and myself, facilitated the on ice sessions, while Mike Pickles ran the off ice sessions. There was a lot of positive emails about how much they appreciated the camps and how much their daughter learned throughout the two (2) days. We are planning on offering three (3) camps next season and are confident we will continue with our success.

FMAAA and POE Identification Camp

Throughout April and May 2019 the FMAAA & POE identification camps ran cohesively with over 270 athletes participating in four (4) camps. All camps have run well and costs have remained down and players got exposure.

We were able to involve coaches from all regions of the province in camps, working with them mentoring in player evaluation criteria, physical testing standards and program quality. We have found and built relationship with good people across the province.

Program

The officiating program has continued to work hard over the course of the 2018-2019 season to enhance the experience of officiating participants. Particular initiatives this past year included: A continued presence on Hockey Canada work groups, online enhancements to game incident reporting and the second season of the e-game sheet program, continued minor mentorship and an updated curriculum.

The BC Hockey Rule Change Task Group contributed several rule change proposals for review at the Hockey Canada Winter Congress.

Minor Mentorship entered the fifth season of operation and continues to be the cornerstone of the development program. The officiating program prepared and integrated the 2018-2020 Hockey Canada rule changes along with an adjustment to the clinic presentation and promotional items to reflect the BC Hockey 100th year anniversary.

For the seventh consecutive season the minor officiating program participated in six (6) special event nights in cooperation with the WHL franchises located within BC. 77 minor officials participated in these events. 10 officials were also able to participate in the annual NHL officiating night in cooperation with the Canucks Centre for BC Hockey.

Social Media and Website Resources

The Officiating Program launched the @BCHockey_Refs twitter account in December 2012 and has amassed 1,645 followers since. The account is used to regularly interact with BC Hockey officiating program participants and interested followers. Images of the many initiatives, clinics, opportunities, accomplishments and articles that impact officials are communicated through this medium. In October 2018 the Officiating Program launched the @BCHockey_Refs Instagram account, which has gained 373 followers.

BC Hockey officiating web page has continued to receive regular updates throughout the 2018-2019 season. The officiating home page serves as a resource for current events within the program. Visitors are also provided with the ability to quickly access clinic, Minor Mentorship and High Performance information along with Summer school registration and information on how to get started as a returning or new official as well as several other useful resources.

In the fall, BC Hockey partnered with the WHL, Hockey Alberta, Saskatchewan Hockey Association and Hockey Manitoba to create the Western Officiating Development Video Series, a nine (9) part series that was published every two (2) weeks throughout the season. The series provides BC Hockey officials, local developers and anyone interested in officiating several new video resources covering a variety of officiating topics to enhance ongoing training and development. Episodes feature current officials from each Member Association, high performance officials and professional officiating alumni that developed within our own community Associations. The collective goal was to provide new resources that will enrich the development of any official regardless of their age or level of experience. The video series will continue in the 2019-2020 season.

Clinics

BC Hockey has been utilizing a program developed electronic presentation for the past six (6) seasons to guide HCOP instructors during clinics. This presentation was updated during the summer of 2018 in preparation for the start of the season. The major updates included in the 2018-2019 clinic curriculum included the implantation of the 2018-2020 Hockey Canada rule changes, along with cosmetic



adjustment to reflect the BC Hockey 100th year anniversary. Also, all High Performance exams were conducted online. All level 1-3 officials took a hybrid version of the exam, which included a question and answer discussion, as well as multiple choice questions.

Mentorship

The BC Hockey Officiating program entered the fifth season of the Minor mentorship and supervision program. The program launches on Thanksgiving weekend each year and the supervisory staff consists of the 12 Delivery Group Members, Minor Development Facilitator, Female Facilitators, Branch Referee in Chief, plus 20 additional minor supervisors across the province.

The program is conducted by assigning a mentor to Minor Hockey Association tournaments, championships or special events at the Atom to Juvenile levels. The goal of the program is to further development outside classroom instruction into practical live game situations. Each mentorship weekend allows the Officiating Program an inside look at how officiating development is progressing in each individual Association.

Minor mentors are responsible for providing supervisions on the HCR for each official they see over a mentorship weekend. If the official participates as a referee and a linesman, there will be a total of two (2) supervisions entered on that specific official, regardless of the number of games they are supervised in.

In total, over the five (5) seasons of this program, 5415 supervisions have been documented in the HCR. The statistics below now outline the number of supervisions entered, either single or multiple entries.

Female Officiating Development

During the 2018-2019 season, there were several events that were used for female officiating development initiatives. In July six (6) officials from every region of the province gathered in Shawnigan Lake to participate in the inaugural Female Officiating Program of Excellence in conjunction with the Team BC selection camp. This event prepares officials to transition from the minor and elite minor divisions of hockey to our High Performance leagues. In August, the Female HP training seminar saw 27 officials from across the province gather in Coquitlam. Officials completed physical and rules testing and participated in on-ice and off-ice workshops and skill development over two (2) days. In November 14 officials were selected to officiate the Junior Women’s Hockey League showcase weekend in Richmond. In March 14 officials were selected to officiate the Canadian Sports School Hockey League female championships in Penticton. Later that month, 13 officials were selected to officiate the Bantam Female Championships in Coquitlam. Two (2) officials were also selected to officiate the PeeWee Tier 2 Championships in West Vancouver.

The Player Development Advisory Group enjoyed a productive year with a focus on developing a foundation for development of players in the British Columbia and the Yukon, while expanding on projects to provide more opportunities to our membership. These focuses included, but were not limited to, creating a framework to institute player pathways developed by Hockey Canada, the operation of skills camps through our Regional Centres, and hosting U14 High Performance Goaltending Clinics in conjunction with Hockey Canada.

Our efforts this season, which are described in detail below, provide a terrific framework to support Player Development for our membership for years to come.

Player Pathways

Building on the successes of the Initiation/Novice programming, Hockey Canada has developed an Atom Pathway Plan, the next phase in player development.

The pathway outlines an optimal seasonal structure and age appropriate development guidelines and consists of five (5) guiding principles, as well as key recommendations, all focusing on the appropriate development for nine (9) and 10-year-old players. The pathway also delivers a positive experience during tryouts by providing pre-tryout ice sessions and avoiding tryouts during the first week of school which can be stressful for players and families.

Implementation of the Atom Pathway is targeted for the 2020-2021 season, with the opportunity for members to have input on the development of our implementation and to use the program as a pilot for the 2019-2020 season.

Regional Centres – Skills Camps

During the 2018-2019 season, we were able to expand on the camps and clinics offered by our Regional Centres to provide more support to our membership. These camps have included position specific training (Defensive Skills, Shooting and Scoring for forward), Checking and Small Area Games, and General Skills camps. With the opening of the Regional Centre – North, we have been able to provide our membership with more development opportunities than ever before.

U14 High Performance Goaltending Clinics

2018-2019 saw the introduction of the U14 High Performance Goaltending Clinics by Hockey Canada. BC Hockey was able to host three of these clinics in Salmon Arm, Shawnigan Lake, and Chilliwack. We received overwhelmingly positive feedback on these clinics and added a fourth in Prince George for the 2019-2020 season.

Safety

Mental Health

In October 2018 BC Hockey partnered with Buddy Check for Jesse. We worked with all the Minor Hockey Associations in Greater Victoria as well as all BC Hockey leagues to participate in an awareness weekend for Mental Health the last weekend in October.



For the 2019 season we are looking to expand to the entire province to participate. More information will be distributed in the upcoming month.

Sportsmanship Starts in the Stands

The Safety Committee is doing a full review on the Sportsmanship Starts in the Stands program. We are looking to make the program more attractive and easier for the Minor Hockey Associations to facilitate the required parent meetings.

Safe Sport Working Group

Brianna Davey and myself attend Safe Sport training for Children in November 2018. The Safety Committee is reviewing Code of Conducts and BC Hockey processes to ensure that all policies and procedures are in line to provide the children with the safest playing environment.

Hockey Canada Safety Program

I have been working with the HCSP working group and created a Special needs module that is now completed and will be added to the program.

For September 2019 we will have a number of resources available on the website to assist with MHA risk Managers to aid in their annual set up and understand what is needed to be completed:

School Programming

Brien Gemmell, School Programming Coordinator

School Programming has had another productive year. The facilitation of quality observations and the continuation to build relationships between hockey and the school system has been a focus.

Hockey Canada Skills Academy Observations

BC Hockey has 37 Hockey Canada Skills Academy (HCSA) programs which service approximately 1100 student-athletes. These programs are specifically designed to enhance individual skill and mesh perfectly into the minor hockey system.

Along with providing administrative support, BC Hockey conducts several Sport Quality Observations every year to assist program delivery, create best practices and ensure the BC Hockey standards are upheld. This year observations were conducted in Burnaby, Invermere and Midway.

Hockey Canada Accredited School Observations

BC Hockey is home to several Hockey Canada Accredited School (HCAS) programs. Our relationship with these programs is productive and positive as we support their operations through administration, policy and sport quality observations.



Through the 2018-19 BC Hockey, along with Educational Consultant Cam Hodgson, visited four (4) HCAS programs.
