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CHAIR OF THE BOARD REPORT

From those dark days, we have started to look at our administration of hockey with a much more critical eye and a goal of safe hockey for all. This year positive growth was witnessed in many areas. Not only were these workgroups established to provide important recommendations and hold accountability, but I was also beyond pleased at the number of volunteers that put their names forward to serve. The hockey community in B.C. and Yukon stepped up to provide their expertise and support on challenging but critical topics.

Jointly, all of us, must continue to commit whole heartedly to creating a diverse, inclusive, and welcoming sport that makes everyone feel they have place. We must also focus on supporting the growth of hockey at the grassroots level. A robust grassroots hockey system is the foundation for all or our success. I continue to be committed to thoughtfully reshaping hockey in B.C. and Yukon.

- A place where every child feels safe,
- A place where everyone feels welcomed and included,

Their success is driven by their individual commitment to excellence, and the grassroots volunteers dedicated to developing minor hockey.

OPERATIONAL REPORT

Hockey is noisy again! That's been true this year in the greatest of ways – as arenas roared back to capacity - and (at times) in not-so-great ways. After three challenging seasons (where we all juggled the challenges of a pandemic) the summer of 2022 came along, and the culture of hockey was placed under a microscope. Our national body, Hockey Canada, grabbed headlines for the wrong reasons, and the knock-on effect for all of us at the grassroots level required real attention and action. Our game is changing, and we will all be better for it.

The good news though; hockey people rise to these things. It is on that note that I want to first recognize the efforts of everyone who makes hockey happen on rinks all across our region. It's coaches, officials, and volunteers in the thousands that make our game great. Energetic and caring people whose adaptability and determination always makes the best of the noisy and difficult circumstances, and who fuelled our ability to deliver safe, fun, and exciting hockey this past season.

I can report that, together, we delivered some of our best-ever hockey experiences in 2022-23. One of our goals for the past year (the first "normal" one in a while) was to battle test this "new BC Hockey" approach to how we steward the game. Starting with clear alignment between the Board, the operations staff, and membership, we stayed true to remembering why we are all here, and how we ought to engage with each other. You may have noticed that we are activating on a new vision for our organization, with better communication, a focus on grassroots, a new-ish Strategic Plan, and a strong commitment to our missions and values in dozens of ways, big and small.

Adding to our efforts this past year has been the commitment to align with a changing Hockey Canada. This has included our joining the national dialogue on some systemic issues with the governance and the culture of our game. A big challenge? Definitely, but a welcome one. Here on the west coast, we were already determined to accelerate positive change when Hockey Canada made its leadership changes and introduced a new direction as well. We moved quickly to align with new Canada-wide processes for dealing with maltreatment, for example. Some of the changes became practical and operational priorities, and although there were growing pains, we are proud to have been able to pivot quickly without compromising on any of the other positive work already underway. We modified our operational team, worked hard with Hockey Canada on the national Action Plan, and our own Board created and resourced new Work Groups for Safe Sport and Equity, Diversity & Inclusion as we redouble our efforts to lead.

Putting our people first ("Hey, Ref!")

It is obvious that our strength lies in our talented people, and in particular our volunteers, we so we strive to spend a lot of time focused on them. We continued to dial up our internal communications, paid increased attention to officials, to our coaching pathways, to the challenges of disruptions caused by non-sanctioned hockey in our communities, and to volunteer burn-out.

We are proud of what we have done this past year, together, in bringing hockey back into our arenas, better and stronger than ever in some ways. Just one example; through some targeted initiatives, our officiating numbers roared back. In fact, our percentage increase in participant count for on-ice officials was the largest in Canada, with numbers that pushed past pre-pandemic levels, to an all-time high. Not





every corner of our ecosystem has recovered as well, but we know where the struggles are, and we are committed to finding ways to help.

Zeroing in on big picture trends ("Change!")

Along with ongoing concerns about aging arenas, ice allocation, cost, and retaining participants and volunteers in this digital age, we have heard from families that there is a growing desire for flexibility, transparency, and real change in a variety of areas. Some change has happened fast (new processes for maltreatment triaging and handling), some are just getting warmed up (how to deal with new non-sanctioned choices), and some have been around awhile and have become the subject of increased focus (unrest within membership about some of our own rules, and how to address the ongoing question of how to better welcome newcomers to our game).

The truth is, what a family wants from their hockey experience in 2024 is not the same as it was in the past. These days, there are heightened expectations in terms of both the on-ice hockey experience and in terms of what BC Hockey (and Hockey Canada) membership delivers. That's fine. We're up for it! We listen and we stay ready to consider this ever-changing landscape, and our own delivery model, in a way that imagines a best future. Growing and improving our game is a race without a finish line.

Building on our achievements ("Rebound!")

Delivering hockey in a non-profit model requires thoughtful strategies, and at its core this means taking a member-first and participant-centric approach at every turn. We are all here, together, to Engage, Enrich, and Envision (the pillars of our Strategic Plan) in hundreds of ways, big and small, every day.

We're especially pleased (again) with our continued commitment to financial stability. As our national body struggled with funding, we have enjoyed strong revenues and some recent surpluses. This allows us to do more, fund more initiatives, and be innovative with strategies to reduce our surplus. Spending resources where it matters most to our members feels good!

Heartfelt thanks ("Top Shelf!")

Last, and most of all, I'd like to finish by repeating myself and again thanking the member organizations and the thousands of people – mostly volunteers – that make hockey possible in B.C. and Yukon. Your support during what has been an extraordinary year, is appreciated by our staff. We come to work every day inspired by what we all are accomplishing together for our 60,000+ participants.

Hockey will always have its challenges. We are a big family, with diverse views on what the game should be. Our game is fast and fun but delivering it can be complicated and expensive. We ask our participants to navigate a lot of administrative rules, and there are still people in our community are still not sure if they and their children are welcome. We don't gloss over these truths, and we don't hide from them. Instead, we work hard to ensure everyone feels welcomed, and we continue to rise to these challenges, together. That's what teammates do.

Finally, I look forward to the future. I am excited about once again being able to meet in person and toast new beginnings at the Congress in June and get to work on an even better 2023-24.

GOVERNANCE

Neil McNabb, Governance Committee Chair

The Governance Committee has had another busy year. The focus of our year to date has been to:

- Continue the review of BC Hockey's Bylaws and Regulations.
 - We continued the ongoing project of the review of BC Hockey's Bylaws and Regulations however the Board of Directors has asked that the Governance Committee put on hold any major updates until the impact of the Cromwell Report and the governance changes at Hockey Canada are understood.
 - The Governance Committee has focused its attention since 2018 on revising the Bylaws and Regulations to fix typos, clean up defined terms and fix inconsistencies to clarity and consistency without materially changing any meanings or interpretation within the Bylaws and Regulations. Our goal is to make the Bylaws and Regulations easy to read and understand. You will see another resolution to support this project in the Notice of Motions for the 2023 Annual General Meeting. We hope that you will support the Governance Committee in its work by supporting this Resolution.
 - Once we have completed the comprehensive clean up, and after the Hockey Canada reports and governance changes are understood we will continue to work on additional more substantive issues in the Bylaws and Regulations. We have already identified several areas where the Bylaws and Regulations are not clear or consistent, but the changes required are changes which could impact their meaning or interpretation. A strategy to resolve these issues which will involve engagement with the Members is being developed. You should expect to hear more about this project next season. The input from the Board-led Standing Committee will also be incorporated into the work plan for the following season.





- Term Limits for Directors.
 - The term limits for Directors resolution(s) drafted by the Governance Committee and submitted to the Members on behalf of the Board was defeated at the 2022 Annual General Meeting (AGM).
 - ii. However, it is still felt that the suggested Term Limits changes are good governance, and the Board has recommended a similar resolution be submitted again for the 2023 AGM following more member engagement.
- Update the Championship Policy
 - i. To move regulations 7.10, 7.11 and 7.12 to Policy (BC Hockey Policy on Championships is 8.0 in the Policy Manual) to offer flexibility to adjust host districts on a year-to-year basis to be more flexible on finding suitable host districts with more associations in those categories.
 - ii. The process would be for the BC Hockey Minor Committee to vote and approve on any host district adjustments prior to the BC Hockey AGM annually.
 - Hockey Canada More Restrictive/Less Restrictive regulation change.
 - i. Our current bylaws are not in compliance with Hockey Canada's, and we need to update ours to be in compliance.
 - Prepare the Resolutions Package for the 2023 Annual General Meeting.
 - i. In addition to the above, the Governance Committee also reviews the Member submitted resolutions as part of our regular tasks. This year there were no resolutions put forward by Members.

Once again, a special thanks to our staff support, Julie Dobell, for keeping things on track and our CEO, Cameron Hope, for making sure we always have the support we need. My extra special thanks to the rest of the Governance Committee for working so hard and for helping me get up to date and for putting up with my questions.

The Governance Committee developed and adopted a 2022–23 Workplan. Highlights of Workplan include:

The following have been identified as possible priorities for the 2022-23 Governance Committee. The list reflects a preliminary prioritization; however, it is expected that the Committee will vary the







plan by identifying further priorities and by reacting to Board priorities as the year evolves and the Committee meets to discuss these items.

- 1. Request for Governance Committee Review of Championship Regulations
 - a) Background:
 - i. BC Hockey Championship regulations 7.10. 7.11 and 7.12 refer to the host district rotations for the various minor championships. The rotation is an eight-year algorithm that allocates the various U13, U15, U18 an U21 championships in the following categories: Tier 1, 2, 3, 4 and Female.
 - ii. The assigned district to host each championship each year proves the district first right of refusal if they have an association that is willing and able to host in that particular category.
 - iii. Each year, there are cases of which there are no minor hockey associations in a district in a particular category/division for a championship that is scheduled in their district in that year. The next step is to go to an open bid process if there are no associations put forth as able/willing to host in that district, and any association in B.C. or Yukon that has a team in that category can bid on becoming the host.
 - b) Request:
 - i. To move regulations 7.10, 7.11 and 7.12 to Policy (BC Hockey Policy on Championships is 8.0 in the Policy Manual) to offer flexibility to adjust host districts on a year-to-year basis to be more flexible on finding suitable host districts with more associations in those categories.
 - ii. The process would be for the BC Hockey Minor Committee to vote and approve on any host district adjustments prior to the BC Hockey Annual General Meeting annually. The complete memo received from staff will be circulated.
- 2. Term Limits for Directors: The term limits for Director's resolution(s) drafted by the Governance Committee and submitted to the Members on behalf of the Board was defeated at the 2022 AGM. The consequences should be reviewed by the Governance Committee. The Board may consider a similar resolution be submitted again for the 2023 AGM following more member engagement.
- 3. Bylaws / Terms of Reference for Standing Committees, Advisory Groups: An update on this project will be given. This item is being looked at by the Board via an assembled work group. The purpose is to review the design and Terms of Reference of BC Hockey Standing Committees and Advisory Groups. The Governance Committee should be prepared if recommendations come forward. It is also an opportunity for the Governance Committee to work with the work group on this project.
- 4. Revised Bylaws and Regulations: The membership approved the resolution submitted for the 2022 AGM that allowed a major cleanup of the Bylaws and Regulations.
 - This work has been completed and a new Handbook is expected shortly. The Resolution was a significant part of the Governance Committee's work, along with BC Hockey staff. The proposed amendments were made with the goal of making BC Hockey's Bylaws and Regulations clearer, more consistent and concise, and much easier to read and interpret. The Governance Committee has attempted at all times to make the changes in a manner that DOES NOT IN A MATERIAL WAY change the interpretation of BC Hockey's Bylaws and Regulations.





To recap, the Governance Committee identified a large number of inconsistencies, errors, poorly defined terms and difficult to interpret Bylaws and Regulations and took on the task to clean them up. The work was broken up into three phases as follows:

Phase I: As an actual phase the cleanup of typos, inconsistencies and defined terms has already been completed. The Members passed resolutions to allow the CEO to make such changes. The items included in the 2021-22 review are in additional to the completed clean up.

Phase II: To clean up terminology that is out of date and/or no longer used and make things more consistent and concise. The Members have now passed resolutions to allow this to take place.

Phase III: Preliminary work has been completed for "Phase III" of this project which deals with revising Bylaws and Regulations beyond the scope of the work that has been completed. The Governance Committee now moves on to complete this stage. It is the intention to move forward with this project.

5. Review of Bylaws, Regulations and Policies Further to the information above, the BC Hockey Board has preliminarily indicated a desire for a major review of the contents and placement of the present Bylaws, Regulations and Policies.

Examples of the work to be done include:

- Review of current BC Hockey Bylaws to consider / recommend better placement of certain Bylaws as either Regulation or Policy.
- Review of current BC Hockey Regulations to consider / recommend better placement of certain Regulations as Policy.
- Review current BC Hockey Policies to separate policies into Board policy, Operations policy and Organization policy.

This <u>very large, multifaceted project</u> will include building a work plan that includes elements designed to build Membership knowledge and support of the project as well as to engage them in the purpose, development process and review of the work accomplished.

6. Revisions to BC Hockey Policy, Terms of Reference and any operational documents

Updates are required to bring these resources in line with the changes made to the Bylaws and Regulations in the Phase I and Phase II above. Consideration is needed as to the complications item #5, above, may have.

7. Review of Current Members Obligations

The Bylaws and Regulations lack clarity around team officials in respect to who they are and the obligations the individuals serving in these capacities may have. As an example, Member obligations have been reviewed in the past, such as who in an organization may require criminal record checks. A review would include looking at the obligations of others such as medical personnel, ownership, scouts or player representatives. The Risk Management Committee could be involved to come up with a process to review member obligations.





8. Organization / Association policy templates and Best Practices

Assistance with building, maintaining and delivery of this product is required.

9. Strategic Planning (ongoing)

The Terms of Reference provide for the Governance Committee to "propose the method and timing for strategic planning". Strategic planning work has been ongoing within BC Hockey. Relations with the Board of Directors are required to ascertain specific concerns that should be addressed.

10. Hockey Canada More Restrictive/Less Restrictive regulation change

Hockey Canada has changed its policy that used to allow Branches and their members to have bylaws or regulation that are more restrictive than Hockey Canada's. Hockey Canada hasn't given a lot of detail yet on what needs to be done to implement this change, but the committee needs to be aware and be ready to develop the appropriate processes and policy or regulation update.

11. Hockey Canada Governance impacts to BC Hockey Update on the review of Hockey Canada governance and any potential impacts. Development of any appropriate processes and policy or regulation updates as required.

ADULT MALE

Trevor Bast, Adult Male Coordinator

British Columbia Intercollegiate Hockey League (BCIHL)

The league welcomed a new team from Logan Lake as a hybrid model of affiliation. It's the second such team and the model is proving to be successful. Next season there is hope of a Fraser Valley team.

Simon Fraser University (SFU) won the league championship with a series sweep of Vancouver Island University (VIU) to cap of a strong season.

Senior AA

A new independent team joined this season from Penticton. They came out very competitive and won the independent bid to play in the 2023 Coy Cup. Dawson Creek beat Fort St. John to capture the other non-Central Interior Hockey League (CIHL) spot.

Coy Cup host Quesnel won the CIHL title and as a result, Terrace, as league runner up participated in 2023 Coy Cup.

The city of Quesnel put on a great championship with the home team going undefeated and winning the Cup over Terrace in a strong final game performance.





JUNIOR

This past season, Junior hockey in B.C. consisted of 43 Junior B teams made up from three leagues, the Kootenay International Junior Hockey League (KIJHL), the Pacific Junior Hockey League (PJHL) and the Vancouver Island Junior Hockey League (VIJHL), and 18 Junior A teams in the BC Hockey League (BCHL). In addition, there were two B.C.-based Junior B teams, Dawson Creek Junior Canucks and the Fort St. John Huskies, that played in the North West Junior Hockey League (NWJHL) based out of Alberta.

Junior B

The 2022-23 season was a strong season for BC Hockey Junior B teams, playing in front of larger crowds and several teams having major improvements on the ice from seasons prior.

The Kimberley Dynamiters were the KIJHL champions, the Delta Ice Hawks were crowned PJHL champions, and the Oceanside Generals took home the VIJHL title. Those three teams along with the host Revelstoke Grizzlies competed for BC Hockey's provincial Junior B championship, the Cyclone Taylor Cup with Revelstoke defeating Kimberley in the Gold Medal game in front of a sold-out crowd at the Revelstoke Forum.

The Fort St. John Huskies won the NWJHL (Alberta) championship for the second year in a row.

Junior A

The British Columbia Hockey League (BCHL) once again hosted their Showcase in Chilliwack near the start the 2022-23 campaign. They also hosted their all-star festivities in Penticton and their "Road Show" in Burns Lake.

The Penticton Vees took home the regular season title with a 50-3-0-1 record. The league is still competing in their playoffs at the time of this report.

MINOR

<u>Stephanie White, Committee Chair</u> <u>Lee Holland, Vice Chair</u>

The Minor Committee is comprised primarily of the BC Hockey District Presidents and a representative from the Board of Directors. Our mandate is to advise the Board of Directors on recommendations affecting minor hockey in British Columbia, in accordance with key duties outlined in the Minor Committee Terms of Reference.

This past season the Minor Committee has met 12 times via video conference since last September. The Minor Committee took a proactive role in discussing pertinent topics to support the improvement of the game at the minor level as well as providing recommendations to the Board.





The Minor Committee discussed and provided input on the following topic areas:

- Championships
- Hockey Canada and BC Hockey Policy Review
- Safe Sport
- AA Leagues and Hosts
- Female Coach Mentorship
- **Hockey Canada Notices of Motions**
- HCR Documentation of Discipline
- Tiering Review
- Resolutions Bylaws and Regulations

Many thanks to all committee members for the productive conversations and their dedication to minor hockey across the province.

NOMINATIONS

Jennifer Loewen, Nominating Chair

The Nominating Chair (Jennifer Loewen) was selected in October by the Chair of the Board and was approved by the Board of Directors shortly thereafter. Four meetings were held prior to the committee being formed (the purpose of the meetings was to ensure deadlines were understood, to search for committee members and to understand the needs of the organization/Board). The Chair of the Board tasked the Nominating Chair with finding a diverse set of applicants who could best serve the membership on a governance board. The current Board was tasked with completing a Skills Matrix so that the Nominating Committee could source out applicants who had skills in areas that were believed to be missing both with the current and upcoming board.

In November, the Nominating Committee was approved. Harold Bloomenthal, Jacquelyn Novak, Mike Rispin and Krista Strand brought various experiences from both hockey and non-hockey backgrounds for the purpose of recruiting a strong and diverse list of candidates. The BC Hockey Communications Team assisted with social media rollouts which included comprehensive posts (including FAQs about the roles) as well as shorter posts which highlighted skills that the Board may be looking for. The Board was updated in January and provided feedback on progress to date. Another social media campaign was run in efforts to reach applicants with additional skill sets based on requests from Directors.

A total of 20 applications were received by the March 11th deadline. Each applicant received prescreening questions as well as a skills-matrix questionnaire that were required to be completed prior to interview. One applicant withdrew at this stage. The Committee felt it was the best interest of the membership to interview each applicant prior to creating the first list of applicants for the membership. The committee ensured that two members were present for each interview and provided feedback to the group after each interview. After the final interview the committee met to discuss the potential approved list for circulation for the membership. A total of 11 candidates were approved by the nominating committee. All applicants were advised of their status by email prior to the list being circulated. A total of 12 applicants were approved on the list due to a Minor Hockey Association (MHA) nominating after the deadline. Policy allows for an MHA to put forward a







nomination after the deadline. This applicant was not interviewed but was required to complete the pre-screening and skills matrix questionnaire.

The application was removed from the BC Hockey website after the first set of interviews. The final list was circulated per policy after the final deadline. Nominees were sent an email to advise them to record their bio and were given a deadline of May 14th so that the Communications Team would have ample time to edit and prepare for release to the membership ahead of the 2023 Annual General Meeting (AGM).

Overall, the Nominating Committee feels that this was a successful year in recruiting given the overall number of applicants and the quality of the applicants. All applicants, selected or not, had a lot to offer the Board of Directors. An area of growth for next year is based on geographical diversity. There is a distinct lack of interest from applicants who reside north of Kamloops. There is concern that the Board of Directors may not adequately represent the full range of the membership as a result of this lacking piece. The other area of growth for next season is specific to applicant screening. This year showed an increase in overall applications and while 19 were manageable, there needs to be a mechanism to screen applicants should there be a larger influx of applications. One suggestion is a change to the skills matrix that the current board completes along with a matching process to the completed matrix of the applicants. This will require a few changes to matrix that is currently used. The completed matrix questions, along with the prescreening questions, would become part of the application process for incoming applicants.

The Nominating Committee has a responsibility to ensure that the membership has a good list of candidates to select from. The membership has a responsibility to review each nominee and reach out to them to ensure they understand who they are voting for, ahead of AGM. Nominees are not required to be at Annual Congress which means there is no opportunity for the membership to have question and answer periods just ahead of voting. While this year the Nominating Committee was able to produce a reasonable number of options for the membership, it is too early to say if this is due to changes in how recruiting was done or if it was simply a year where people wanted to become involved based on issues at the National level. The current Nominating Committee has expressed interest to be involved again next year to serve the Board and membership in efforts to recruit for future vacancies.

The BC Hockey Discipline Task Group's responsibility was to administrate the documentation of suspensions within the Hockey Canada Registry for participants that were penalized with match, gross or refusing to start play infractions at the minor hockey level. They were to complete any applicable investigations and notify the participant of their corresponding suspension. This is the fifth season for Byron Rice as a Coordinator and sixth season operating with this task group.

This season has seen its challenges. We have had an increase in Refusal to Start Play penalties being assessed this year. These have more than double previous year's numbers. There has also been an increase in applications for appeals this year. These have all fallen within the BC Hockey Policy Manual, Section 4.04 Video Review Policy. This has increased the amount of time to be spent on investigations.

We also saw an increase under Rule 11.4 Gross Misconduct – Discrimination Allegation. The task group members would review the allegation, and if deemed to be valid, then send it off to the discipline coordinator for further review. This was then sent onto the BC Hockey Liaison to coordinate with Hockey Canada Independent Safe Sport Complaint Process.

The task group members have completed their suspensions in a timely manner, and we have had very few appeals. Overall, the BC Hockey Discipline Coordinator noted that the task group was very conscientious and worked hard to keep up with the necessary investigations. Positive feedback was received from the district and minor hockey associations. The Discipline Task Group utilized BC Hockey Bulletin 2022-013 "2022-23 Minimum Suspension Guidelines – Minor/Female" to complete their administrative duties.

The Indigenous Participation Workgroup continues to meet on a regular basis.

As a result of the groups meeting discussions and recommendations the following items were completed during the 2022-23 season:

Indigenous cultural safety training for Minor Hockey Associations

In partnership with the ISPARC, BC Hockey was able to facilitate an in-person seminar during the 2022 Annual Congress. This workshop covered the following topics:

- Knowledge and understanding of Indigenous history and training to build understanding of the need for cultural safety.
- Setting a tone for safe conversations trust and relationship building.
- Experiential learning that deepens the learning, understanding and ongoing impact of the country's history and the strained relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.
- Examination of how practice and systemic cultures contribute to ongoing barriers that exist deconstructing policies and practice standards how to move forward in a good way that can support collaboration.
- Encourage examination of organizational culture and what might be important to strengthen Indigenous non-Indigenous relationships and shift attitudes through conflict management strategies.
- Building connections for participants for inclusion of Indigenous communities and organizations, and importance of building sustainable relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities.
- Guide organizations to consider Indigenization initiatives, to reduce barriers for Indigenous people.
- Encouraging organizations to consider beliefs and values Indigenous peoples hold and how they can contribute toward successful business practice.







A seminar will also be provided during the 2023 Annual Congress with a focus on relationship building and best practices for incorporating indigenous reconciliation activities.

Indigenous Liaison

Ryneld Starr continues in the role of Indigenous Liaison. The primary responsibilities of this position are to assist with the development, implementation, and evaluation of an Indigenous participant strategy. Efforts have been made to assist process our members in their efforts to build relationships with Indigenous Communities. The 2022-23 season resulted in some of our Minor Hockey Associations (MHA) either planning or hosting Indigenous "try hockey" camps to initiate positive interactions within their communities. A long-term workplan has been developed and reviewed by the workgroup that sets out tasks and deliverables as we continue to move forward.

There was no member from the North West this season so in consultation with the District President, I dealt with requests that would have gone to the District Task Group member. Hopefully, we'll have a task group member from this District for the upcoming season. All current members are returning for the 2023-24 season.

Over the season, we have regularly scheduled video conferences where we discuss any policies, issues, or anything else that may be of concern to a District. Quite often, if a District has a specific problem, another District may have dealt with it so we can exchange ideas. We review goaltender transfers for carded teams and some residential waivers early in the season. Throughout the season we deal with goaltender replacement requests, tournament team requests, recreational player replacement requests and out of province travel requests and assist the associations where we can.

Tournament Team and Recreational Player Relief requests were up this season, closer to pre-Covid levels. We approved 188 Recreational Player Relief (BC Hockey Policy 7.12) requests and 83 Tournament Team (BC Hockey Policy 7.13) requests. This is double the Recreational Player Relief requests and about 60% more Tournament Teams than last season. Of the Recreational Relief requests, 30 were for goaltenders and three were denied – one because the team had too many available players from their team to fit the criteria and two because they were incomplete requests submitted on the day the tournament started. Several last-minute requests with all required information were received and approved. Out of Province travel requests were also up this season, mainly due to the lifting of travel restrictions.

The biggest issue noted by all Districts this year was the lack of goaltenders at all levels. Some teams had no goaltender for the season and had to rely on skaters filling in, affiliates or Goaltender Relief. This year one Task Group member dealt with over 100 requests for goaltender replacement under BC Hockey Policy 7.01 in their District. This is a big increase over last season. As a group, we're not sure what can be done, but would appreciate input from Districts or Minor Hockey Associations (MHAs) who have come up with solutions to this issue.

The other issue noted by all Districts was a problem with some teams or MHAs submitting incomplete requests, mainly for Tournament Teams or Recreational Player Relief requests. These request forms were updated last summer, but even in late March, associations were submitting requests using old forms which don't include all the required information which ultimately results in delays for approving applications. There will be some updates to forms over the next few months, so please use the most







current form and include all required documents when submitting requests to prevent processing delays.

Thanks to the members of the Operations Task Group, MHA and District Presidents, MHA and District members as well as Brianna Davey and the staff at BC Hockey who deal with and respond to our requests so quickly.

COACHING

Dave Cunning, Manager, Athlete Development

The 2022-23 season was another very productive year in the Coaching department as we returned to a more recognizable version of a hockey season — albeit with some evolutions to our delivery mechanics that bridge the virtual and in-person presentation styles of coach education that we adopted during the COVID-19 pandemic. Our dedicated and synergistic group of clinic facilitators, evaluators, and coordinators within the Coaching Program Delivery Group worked tremendously hard to complete another clinic season and provide meaningful development and mentorship opportunities to our B.C. and Yukon coaches.

Clinics

Coaching clinics were delivered in both virtual and in-person formats during the 2022-23 clinic season – Coach 1 and Coach 2 remained fully online for the second consecutive year, while Development 1 featured an online Part 1 and an in-person Part 2. High Performance 1 (HP1) was hosted in a hybrid format, and saw Hockey Canada offer a nationally delivered virtual component to complement each province's delivery of the seminar. The in-person portion of HP1 took place at UBC Okanagan in Kelowna.

From 2021-22, clinic participant increases were seen at Coach 1 (+53%), Coach 2 (+19%) Development 1 (+9%), and in Specialty Clinics (+156%) in 2022-23. We hosted 27 more clinics this year than last season, and 777 more coaches engaged with our clinics, than in 2021-22.



Furthermore, aside from Checking, every clinic saw its highest participant totals since before the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021-22. These statistics are a strong indication that engagement with coach education has returned (and now surpassed) normalcy.



Female Coach Development

In partnership with Hockey Canada, BC Hockey hosted two *We Are Coaches* clinics in the 2022-23 season. These clinics are for female coaches only and are hosted by female facilitators progressing through Hockey Canada's Women's Master Coach Developer (WMCD) program. Both online clinics we hosted this season qualified the 38 total delegates who attended with Coach 2 – Coach Level trained status. This season's trained coach total is another increase from 2021-22 (36) and 2020-21 (18), showing continued growth in the female coach education space. All delegates were reimbursed their clinic costs as part of the program's initiative to remove barriers of engagement.

This past season we also saw four female coaches from B.C. (Whitney Juszkiewicz, Amy de Bree, Amanda Sargeant Levesque, and Debbie Beaudoin) once again spotlighted by the NHL Coaches Association (NHLCA) as participants in their Female Coaches Development Program.

Mentorship

Specialty Clinics:

BC Hockey hosted 13 National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) Instructional Stream Specialty Clinics in the 2022-23 season, up from seven in 2021-22. Five were delivered virtually (four Goaltending 1 clinics and one Goaltending 2), while eight went in-person (four Goaltending 2 clinics, two Skating 1 clinics, one Skating 2 clinic, and one Skills 1 clinic) across various locations in the Lower Mainland and on Vancouver Island. In total, 264 coaches took advantage of these professional development opportunities, a 156% increase from last season. These clinics are delivered at the request of BC Hockey members – engagement statistics make it clear that coaches and MHAs alike see their value.





Graduates and current delegates from the Hockey Canada Skills Coach and Hockey Canada Goaltending Coach certification programs were utilized as facilitators for these clinics, which allowed them to complete components of their certification tasks and work towards full certification while providing tangible mentorship to B.C. coaches. New facilitators are mentored through the delivery process by our veteran facilitators and will continue to be looked to for delivery of future Instructional Stream clinics across B.C. and the Yukon. It is our hope each season that delegates who attend Instructional Stream Specialty Clinics will apply to the national certification program for Skills and/or Goalie Coaches and bolster our stable of qualified instructors for these clinics.

Coaches certified at the Development 1 and HP1 levels who attended additional coach stream or instructional stream specialty clinics earned professional development points towards the renewal of their certification (both have a five-year renewal window). BC Hockey hosted 97 clinics in total during the 2022-23 season – all opportunities to accrue.

Mentorship:

To date, our field evaluation team has performed 276 Development 1 observations and 22 for High Performance 1 coaches this season, while markers assessed 228 Dev 1 written assignments and 59 for HP1 coaches – all are tremendous mentorship opportunities that pair certification candidate coaches directly with BC Hockey's coach mentors to confirm their competency prior to awarding certification.

Coaching Advisory Group:

The Coach Advisory Group – comprised of coaches from minor hockey, the WHL, Hockey Canada Skills Academies, Hockey Canada Accredited Schools, and our Coaching Program Delivery Group – correspond each season for discussion and formulation of recommendations for the improvement of future programming, review of member submitted content, and to adjudicate the recipients of the Ernie Gare Coach of the Year Award and the Development Award, Coaching.





FEMALE HOCKEY DEVELOPMENT

Jennifer Loewen, Female Hockey Development Coordinator

The 2022-23 season received continued support from the Board of Directors around female hockey development. The Minor Committee also showed their support by continuing to have the Female Model as a standing item on their agenda.

The 2022-23 Zone Lead Team was as follows:

The female zone lead application process was sent out in early February with a closing date of March 7, 2023. The same team will remain for the 2023-24 season. Increasing the interest in these key roles will be a focus for next year. In addition, Zone Leads will have a focus on enhancing support for established female events within their zone as well as promoting new 'try-it' events within their zone.

Female Coach Mentor

The 2022-23 season included the addition of Female Coach Mentor. Three applications were received for this position and Whitney Juszkiewicz was the successful applicant for this role. Whitney presented to Minor Committee in December to clarify what her role would be and offered support to District Associations. To date she has done the following:

Powell River

Whitney facilitated a female coach and player development weekend in Powell River, March 17 to 19. The coach development sessions included one hour of on ice technical skills instruction, four hours of on ice support and three hours of classroom instruction on topics such as building culture and identity and creating concept-based practices.

The player development sessions included skills and concept based on ice instruction. 45 female athletes, ages six to 16 attend the sessions.

Dawson City

In conjunction with the City of Dawson City, Dawson City MHA and Hockey Yukon, a female development weekend was held March 30 to April 2. Whitney facilitated an on-ice skills session for players and coaches. There were six coaches and 31 players ages five to 12 that attended the sessions. A jamboree was also held around the development sessions.

In addition, Whitney has created a document that has outlined areas of focus for this role and will continue to build on the work she has done in the 2022-23 season.





FEMALE AAA AND INTEGRATED AAA PROGRAMS

The 2022-23 season saw the British Columbia Elite Hockey League (BCEHL) operate a full schedule without any major interruptions and really stabilized after recent years.

The BCEHL operated eight showcase events (two per age category), awarded four provincial championships, had teams travel throughout the continent to attend tournaments, showcases, regional championships and even a National Championship!

Female U18 AAA

In 2022-23, the Female U18 AAA league completed its 13th season and saw the Fraser Valley Rush finish the BCEHL regular season with an impressive 32-2-0-0 record.

They continued their success in the post season, securing the Female U18 AAA Provincial Championship by sweeping both their playoff series.

Fraser Valley went on to face the Red Deer Sutter Fund Chiefs in the Pacific Regional Championship, where they swept the Chiefs in two straight games and punched their ticket to Hockey Canada's National Female U18 Club Championship, the Esso Cup.

At the Esso Cup, the Fraser Valley Rush finished second after the preliminary round. In the semifinals, the Rush defeated the Regina Rebels 1-0, and advanced to their second straight Esso Cup Championship Game. In the final, the Rush faced the Stoney Creek Sabres in a high-scoring nine goal affair. After a 5-4 loss to the Sabres, the Rush ended up earning their second straight Esso Cup silver medal to cap off another incredible season for the BCEHL.

For the 2022-23 season, the Female POE program started off with two regional camps in Salmon Arm and Langley. We saw over 180 athletes registered for the camps. The participants were put through fitness testing, on-ice sessions and games over the camp weekend.

From the regional camps, the Top 68 athletes were selected to our female Provincial Camp in Penticton in July 2022. Throughout this camp, athletes were put through more fitness testing, team building, onice practice, on-ice combine testing and intersquad game play. From this stage, we selected the Top





26 athletes to head to our December Camp in Whistler. The team played two exhibition games against the Sea to Sky Bears AA U18 team to select our final roster.

Team BC headed off to Prince Edward Island for the Canada Winter Games in February 2023. The female team competed in week two and had a strong pool of, Quebec, Saskatchewan and New Brunswick. Team BC went undefeated in the round robin, met Nova Scotia in the gold medal game and took home gold after a 3-0 win! This is the first Gold Medal at the Canada Winter Games for Team BC!

The process has begun for the 2023-24 season with our regional camps and evaluation for Provincial Camp to select the team to compete in the U18 Women's National Championship in November 2023!

Male U15 Program of Excellence

The U15 Program of Excellence was operated in a slightly reduced capacity due to the number of participants. We held five regional camps that took place across the province in Prince George, Penticton, Victoria, Delta and Vancouver.

There were 120 athletes that went on to compete in the U15 Provincial Tournament in Penticton. They participated on-ice and off-ice combine testing, team building activities and game play with Team Red finishing the event off by hoisting the trophy.

The U16 Program of Excellence returned in full strength operating all stages leading up to the 2023 Canada Winter Games.

We held five open regional camps that took place across the province in Prince George, Penticton, Victoria, Delta and Vancouver that saw over 400 athletes participate for their opportunity to be on Team BC.

BC Cup had 160 athletes make their way to Salmon Arm to compete and look for their opportunity to be invited to the next stage. Provincial Camp took place in Penticton where 68 athletes brought their best and make it difficult for the staff to choose the 26 athletes who were invited to Whistler for the Prep Camp.

From Prep Camp, 20 athletes were selected to compete in the 2023 Canada Winter Games, which was hosted on Prince Edward Island on February 18-25, 2023.





Team BC went 2-1 in the round robin allowing them to finish second in their pool. This led Team BC to a 4-2 win over Manitoba in the quarterfinal, then fell to Team Ontario 8-6 in the semifinals before facing Team Quebec in the bronze game and ultimately finished fourth.

The process has begun for the 2023-24 season with team selection for the 2023 WHL Cup team to play in Red Deer in October 2023!

Program

The BC Hockey Membership endorsed a financial support initiative that reduced officiating registration fees for the 2022-23 season to \$5.00 and Hockey University 'Officiating 1/2' registration to \$5.00; for the purposes of recruitment, retention and appreciation of officials. Many members begin utilizing the Spordle Play platform for officiating game assignments and improvements were made to the HCR Game Incident report system. Additionally, the Hockey Canada Registry launched the supervision platform, providing access for 139 officiating coaches for the purpose of documenting and tracking officiating development.

The 2022-23 season provided the first opportunity to fully re-engage with the officiating participants in mentorship opportunities throughout the season and the ability to expand offerings of in-person annual training, with no public health restrictions. In addition to in-person certification clinics, the summer officiating schools returned and the relaunch of super clinics. Hockey Canada also conducted a virtual training seminar for officiating program instructors 'Foundations of Instruction.' This season marked the first full season with BC Hockey alumni official and administrator Dan Hanoomansingh in the role of Hockey Canada officiating manager. Hockey Canada also added a second BC Hockey alumni to their national staff in the officiating department with the hiring of Megan





Howes as Hockey Canada Officiating Coordinator. In January 2023, BC Hockey hired Trevor Nolan as program coordinator with a primary focus on the officiating program. Overall, this was a very successful season for the officiating program.

Social Media and Website Resources

The officiating program remained very active on social media and continued to gain followers (125) and increased traffic (just under 1 million impressions). Overall, tweets, impressions, profile visits, mentions and followers were in an upward trend upon the conclusion of the season in March of 2023.

Clinics & Registration

Hockey Canada launched a newly updated nationally standardized curriculum. The curriculum focused upon material for new officials, Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3 officials. The previously mentioned foundations of instruction training so more than 40 BC Hockey officiating instructors participate, in preparation for the launch of the new material. All new officials' clinic curriculum was once again curated and packaged in a manner where it could be delivered in a live setting by the local MHA RIC in either a live lecture format or recorded delivery. Overall, there is still a slight decline in elite official registration due to retirements and officials leaving the High Performance stream, since COVID-19. However, there was an almost 25% increase in overall registration that has surpassed pre-pandemic statistics.

Mentorship & Coaching

The BC Hockey Officiating program was able to increase the presence in arenas with direct coaching and mentoring of officials in game situations. A total of 698 individual officials received documented officiating coaching from 83 different officiating mentors. In certain situations, officials may have received multiple officiating mentorship entries, while others may have received a single entry that outlined feedback from multiple games at a particular event (e.g. championship or tournament). This platform was originally piloted in Junior B before being released to the broader membership. Below general statistics of individual mentorship entries at the various categories of play, upon the relaunch of this program.

Female Officiating Development

Female officiating registration continued to grow with an overall increase of 22% more female officials in 2022-23, compared to 2021-22. Female officials now account for 12% of the overall officiating program participant group and 14% of those under age 16. Female officials also account for 14% of officials that have achieved High Performance certification status. Vanessa Stratton completed her second full season as the Female Lead for High Performance female officiating development. The female officiating program continues to make great strides with providing more opportunities for learning and development through clinics and camps with the resumption of the female High Performance camp in 2022-23

and the foundation plan for female officiating development and female grassroots development to be launched upcoming throughout the next two seasons.

This was also the most successful year the female high-performance officiating program has seen with two officials (Barlow and Pateman) receiving BC Hockey's first female officiating international assignments through the IIHF at the Division IIA and Division IB groups respectively. Additionally, both officials were also selected to officiate at the USPORTS Championships, again, another first for BC Hockey's female officiating program. We had four officials selected to officiate at Canada Winter Games (Thorne, Ross, Laroche and Barthel) and one official selected to officiate at Esso Cup (Dragon). We are seeing exponential growth and success now at the national and international level - again, an unprecedented year for B.C.'s female officiating. Provincially, we had all female crews at CSSHL Championships and BCEHL Championships and high-female presence at all BC Hockey's Provincial Championships.

On the officiating coaching side, we had the highest year in games coached with a 47% increase from last year and an increase of coaches from four to nine. This is an area that is led by Vanessa Stratton, who was selected to be an officiating coach at Canada Winter Games, instructed and led several of the Hockey Canada OPOE camps this past season and will be an officiating coach at the upcoming IIHF Division IA Championships and is one of eight coaches working with a selected group of officials in the IIHF's Road to Milano program.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Player Pathways

The Hockey Canada Player Pathways at the U7, U9, and U11 levels of play have fully integrated into BC Hockey programming for multiple years. New for 2023-24 are Hockey Canada's sequential Pathway guidelines for U13 and U15. These nationally developed pathways outline an optimal seasonal structure, age-applicable development guidelines and guiding principles, and key recommendations, all focused on the appropriate development approach for each age of player they serve. The Pathways aim to deliver a positive experience during tryouts by providing pre-tryout ice sessions and avoiding formalized evaluations during the first week of school which is known to be a stressful time for players and families as they transition into new classrooms, friends, teachers, and sometimes even new cities. This plan is all about setting players up for success by providing them with the best possible opportunity for them to present their best selves in an evaluation environment.

Skills Camp

Over three days in July, BC Hockey offered its first ever Scoring Situations camp, hosted at the Richmond Olympic Oval by Pasco Valana. The camp provided players and goaltenders alike with the unique opportunity to study, take reps at, and increase their Hockey IQ in hockey's 10 scoring situations: Clear Shots, Entries, Net Drives, Breakaways, Rebounds, Low/High, East/West, Below the Goal Line, Deflections, and Screens. Valana led all 25 camp participants (U11, U13, U15 and U18 level) through five ice sessions and two classroom sessions, which dissected and practiced the most common offensive plays in the game while teaching players how to best approach each situation from their side of the play at the same time.





SCHOOL PROGRAMMING

Hockey Canada Skills Academy (HCSA)

There were 788 participants that took part in one of the 21 B.C. HCSA programs operational in 2022-23 – 100 more players than last season and one new school.

BC Hockey delivered three in-person Sport Quality Observations (SQO) at HCSA schools this season, visiting Grandview Heights Secondary School (Surrey), Dr. Kearney Middle School (Fort St. John), and Valleyview Secondary (Kamloops). These observations found all operators to be functioning healthily. The review team left each operator with a list of recommendations, provided an intake for operator feedback, and shared the best practices gleaned from these visits with Hockey Canada and fellow operators.

Hockey Canada Accredited Schools (HCAS)

BC Hockey delivered in-person Sport Quality Observations (SQO) at Burnaby Winter Club, Shawnigan Lake School, RINK Kelowna, and Okanagan Hockey Academy in the fall of 2022. SQOs are a requirement for all HCAS programs in their renewal cycle to ensure ongoing program quality and compliance with national policy. All four observations resulted in full three-year renewal and operational approval of each program.

There were nine CSSHL (Canadian Sport School Hockey League) operators that fielded 45 teams stocked with 861 players across six divisions in 2022-23, a -2.9% participant decrease. New CSSHL teams in 2021-22 included U17 Prep rosters at Burnaby Winter Club and Pacific Coast Hockey Academy.

2022-23 expansions will include U17 Prep and U18 Female Prep rosters at the North Shore Warriors and U15 at Pacific Coast Hockey Academy.

High School Hockey

BC High School Hockey made a successful return to action in 2022 after a two-season hiatus. 296 players populated 13 teams that competed through the regular season in April and then championships in May, which saw Riverside victorious in Tier 3, Robert Bateman prevail in Tier 2, and Heritage Woods declared Tier 1 champions when all was said and done.

The BC High School Hockey program hit the ice once again in 2023. There were 11 returning schools that joined four brand new programs and three others that came back from previous years to populate 18 teams (five more than 2022) across three tiers in pursuit of championships at each level in May. Enthusiasm is high amongst the 387 players (30% more than 2022), as well as the program's coaches and school staff for the 14th season of this Lower Mainland-based program, which, for the first time, includes a school from the North Central region (Lake City Secondary – Williams Lake). When the dust settled, Lake City Secondary was declared Tier 3 Champions, École Riverside Secondary took home the Tier 2 title, and Centennial Secondary prevailed as Tier 1 victor.
