<u> Tournament Program</u>

Once your team has qualified for the Championships, we request the following information:

- Official Team Picture: Highest resolution jpeg will be required for use in the program and the other print material. Please include names of everyone in order as they appear in the team photo and their jersey number as well.
- Association Logo: Please send a high resolution image of your association logo and your home jersey colors.
- Contact information: Please provide Head Coach and Managers names and contact numbers. Please send team picture, team logo and information to <u>kitimatminorhockey@gmail.com</u>
- A video showcasing your team and where they come from. These videos will be shown on our Facebook group site and available for all to see. You can use any format you would like. Should be a light hearted or funny video and keeping up with the spirit of team work and comradery.

<u>Relief Goalies</u>

- There will be a "relief goalie" list that will be made available close to the start of the tournament.
- There is a goalie that will be available as replacements should your starting goalie be unable to play. We are a VERY small community with large distances between communities in the North West so it is highly recommended that you bring two goalies incase injury or illness should happen.
- It is stipulated by BC Hockey that goalies listed as "relief goalies" be currently registered and playing in a lower tier (i.e., Rec League or U13 goalie).

<u>Equipment Checklist</u>

Prior to each team's first game and possibly during the tournament, an equipment check will be conducted by a Referee Committee member with a referee or the BC Hockey Representative.

<u>Important to note:</u>

- Particular importance will be paid to helmets and neck protection
- Any altered equipment will be removed from the game
- Anything that is CSA certified must include the appropriate label
- Ear protection on helmets is required
- Mask must be made for the particular helmet and fit properly
- Throat protectors must be BNQ certified and labeled as such
- No torn pants will be permitted
- Zippered pants must be fully done up

• No large holes in palms of glove. Please see full checklist included at the end of this document. The checklist must be signed by a team representative and provided to the tournament BC Hockey supervisor at the Coaches/Managers meeting to confirm that a check has been completed and all equipment is compliant as per the checklist.

<u>All rules and regulations, round robin rules, game protests, tie breakers, ect will be provided to</u> <u>coaches and managers during the coaches and managers meeting on March 15th.</u>

Fair Play Award

The Fair Play Award in hockey is typically presented to a team, player, or organization that exemplifies sportsmanship, respect for opponents and officials, and clean, ethical play throughout a season or tournament. While specific awards may vary depending on the league or governing body, the concept is consistent: recognizing those who uphold the spirit of the game with dignity and integrity.

This year, the fair play award will be given to the team that shows the most sportsmanlike behavior both ON and OFF the ice. This includes the behavior of the players, the coaches and the parents. We will be looking at behaviors of the team and coaches on the ice. How they treat the referees, how they win or lose with dignity and to a degree, the penalties. Major penalties and game misconducts will also be looked at.

Positive behavior by hockey players in our town contributes to a strong sense of community, sets a positive example for younger athletes, and enhances the overall spirit of the game

Positive behavior by hockey coaches is essential for creating a positive and productive environment for players, fostering their growth both as athletes and individuals. Coaches serve as role models and leaders, influencing not only their team's success but also the culture of the sport.

Positive behavior by parents in the stands at a hockey game is essential for fostering a positive and supportive environment for the players, officials, and other spectators.

We will be checking in with local hotels and restaurants throughout the tournament and keeping an eye on the behavior in the stands to determine the winner of the fair play award. We are working with local industry to provide the winner with a one of a kind token of our appreciation to the kindness shown to our community during your stay. The award will be presented at the end of the final game the winning team plays.

- Climate: Kitimat has a temperate rainforest climate, with mild, wet winters and cool, moist summers.


Outdoor Activities

We acknowledge that we are living, working and playing on the unceded Haisla traditional territory.

We are grateful for the many opportunities that this privilege affords us.



<u> Our Haisla History</u>

The Haisla, meaning "dwellers downriver", have occupied their traditional territory since time immemorial. Today, the Haisla people are centered on Kitamaat Village. Home to approximately 700 of the 2023+ Haisla membership, Kitamaat Village sits at the head of the Douglas Channel in British Columbia. The balance of the Haisla live in places such as Kitimat, Terrace, Prince Rupert, in the metro Vancouver area and the United States.

Today's Haisla Nation is an amalgamation of two historic bands – the Kitamaat of the Douglas and Devastation channels and the Kitlope of the upper Princess Royal Channel and Gardner Canal. Neighbouring nations include the Heiltsuk and Wuikinuxv bands of the Coast Tsimshian peoples.

Living and working on the water has always been important to the Haisla, and that remains so today. The Haisla people have lived off the land and water resources of the Douglas Channel and our traditional territory for hundreds of years, and protection of those resources for future generations is a strong commitment by every Haisla member.

Our territory's resources have sustained us for generations, providing us with food, shelter, and livelihood. We have worked hard to harvest food, build our villages, and develop the resources we need to survive. The land is connected to our past, our culture, and now, our future.

The Haisla social system is based on matrilineal clans. Each clan has a him as (hey-maus: chief) and musmezit (moos-moo-gheethl: matriarch). The present day clan system is as follows: Beaver, Raven, Eagle, Killer Whale/Black Fish/Salmon. Historically there were the Crow, Frog and Wolf clans but due to declining numbers they amalgamated with other clans.

Most Haisla continue to carry on the traditions of hunting, berry picking, gathering and fishing. Every spring, Haisla family groups still travel to the Kemano River for oolichan fishing. During oolichan season the village is full of the rich smell of the fish smoking. After a long, hard North Coast winter, oolichan are the first fish returning to spawn in local rivers. The Haisla use oolichan for almost everything, from food to medicine. Haisla people learned to boil oolichan and make it into a pure white grease, becoming experts producing a quality well known up and down BC's Coast. Haisla people still trade this valuable commodity with neighbouring villages.

<u>Tamitik Arena</u>

Tamitik, which is Kitimat spelled backwards, is home to the Kitimat Winterhawks (BCHL) as well as the Kitimat Ice Demons (CIHL)

This arena will be host to the tier 4 - U15 BC Hockey Championships March 16th-19th, 2025.

The Tamitik concourse will be an interactive zone where various groups and teams throughout Kitimat will provide a number of activities for you to enjoy between games.

The concession in Tamitik Arena is run by the Kitimat Humane Society and all profits made go to help our furry friends.

<u>Travelling Info</u>

Warning: Kitimat is the Haisla word for, "People of the snow." What that means, is we get snow. A LOT OF SNOW. Typically, February brings our largest snow dump. We have been known to get dumps of snow 2-6ft in 24 hours. We also have temperate temperatures so our snow rarely compacts to become ice. Instead, we get slush. HWY crews are continuously out in full force, but please make sure you have winter tires on, and drive slowly and for the conditions.

By vehicle

Wherever you are coming from, you will make your way to Prince George (very close to the geographical center of BC. From Prince George, you will make your way west on HWY 16 and head towards Terrace. As you reach Terrace, you will take a left at the round-about and head to Kitimat via HWY 37. We are an approximate 6 hour drive from Prince George. When we have long trips to make because of hockey tournaments, we like to break our trip up and stay half way. Our favorite half way point is to stop in Prince George is:

<u>By Air</u>



You may not want to make the long drive in the middle of the winter. If you are coming from the greater Vancouver area, you are looking easily at a 14 hour drive. If you choose to fly, you will want to fly into the Terrace BC Airport (YXT) It's a very small airport but flights come in and out of Kitimat 3 times a day. Terrace airport is about a 30 min drive from Kitimat. Our cab companies aren't super reliable and often don't book preordered rides. This leads to my next point. Vehicle rental places. <u>Things to do</u>

Tamitik Jubilee sports center - upstairs in the arena, through the main blue doors, you will gain access to our pool! Diving board, water park, water slide, lazy river, sauna and hot tub are all included.

Riverlodge Recreation Center - Down town towards the Microtel Hotel is our rec center. Here you can rent out the gym for floor hockey, sports, or wall climbing. Various classes are offered in the evenings at Riverlodge and might be a welcome addition to the player's families. Updates to come once the spring guide comes out.

MK Bay Marina - A short drive down to the Kitimaat Village, you will have access to the

Douglas Channel (Ocean). This is an incredible viewing area of the ocean, and there is even a short hiking trail to a look out point (Gazebo). This particular area comes to live during the week of March 17th every year. The herring are chased into the marina by sea lions and Orca whales. Whale sightings are known during this time and it is a marvel to watch the locals fish for herring. Herring is used in the Indigenous culture as well as to local fisherpeople who use it as bait for salmon and halibut fishing.

Minette Bay and Alcan Beach are fantastic areas to go for a picnic lunch and view the beauties of our Ocean!

Museum and Cultural Activities

- **Kitimat Museum and Archives**: A great place to learn about the history of the area, including its Indigenous heritage and the town's industrial development. This could be a nice indoor activity if you need a break from the cold.
- Haisla Nation Cultural Centre: If you want to learn about the local Indigenous culture, this centre offers exhibits and cultural information about the Haisla people.

Hirsch Creek Trail is a popular hiking trail located in the Kitimat region of British Columbia. It offers outdoor enthusiasts an opportunity to explore the natural beauty of the area, with views of forests, streams, and, in some cases, glimpses of the surrounding mountains and valleys.

The Kitimat River is another great spot to visit if you're in the mood for a walk or a relaxing time by the water.

BEAR AWARE



EQUIPMENT CHECKLIST

EQUIPMENT	INSPECT	BASIC THINGS TO LOOK FOR
PANTS	Condition	-No tears, loose threads &/or dangling belts/straps. -Inside zippers done up and working.
STICK		-Plug is in butt end of the stick (top). -Blade has no sharp edges, breakages
HELMET	Condition	-Must have visible CSA label, snug chin strap, ear guards, be tape free & not painted. -Numbers, team decals and decals supporting a cause (ie. Humbolt, Cancer etc.) are permitted -No cracks in shell or padding.
FACEMASK	Condition	-No metal bars broken on cages -Tight screws and if replacements, NOT too long. -Straps snug with stretch in elastic -Clips in place. -NO cracks in plastic -watch for rust at wire seams
GLOVES	Condition	 High enough so covers wrist. Firm fingers, thumb and back padding Palms soft and pliable. NO holes near fingers or in palm larger than a quarter) No loose threads
NECKGUARD	Condition	 -Fits snug enough around neck -MUST have BNQ certification, be free of fabic cuts -Velcro strap NOT worn and in good working order -Must not be altered in any way -Rips or tears should be sewn. -No tape wrapped around neckguard
